DONOR ADVISED FUNDS IN ACTION

Supporting the Mental Health of First Responders



Through their Donor Advised Fund at the Community Foundation of Dunn County, Peter and Emilie Wiese have made two impactful gifts to support the mental health and well-being of local first responders.

The first grant brings Breach Point Consulting to the **Dunn County Sheriff's Office**, offering mental health and resilience training to deputies and jail staff. Led by retired Police Chief Kent Williams, the program helps first responders manage job-related stress, prevent burnout, and build a stronger support culture.

The second grant funds a wellness app for Menomonie's Fire and Police Departments. The Cordico app provides 24/7 confidential access to mental health resources - including stress and sleep self-assessments, guided breathing exercises, and connections to local peer support and providers - tailored specifically for public safety professionals. These investments ensure that those who protect us have the tools and support they need to care for themselves.

Restoring Nature, Renewing History

The **Dunn County Historical Society** is embarking on an exciting project to restore a degraded wetland on its property. By removing topsoil, creating a natural buffer zone, and improving soil health, the project will support local biodiversity and generate income through the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program. The restored wetland will serve as a living classroom connecting our community to both the natural environment and Dunn County's industrial history. This meaningful work is made possible thanks to the generous support of Paul Horvath and Megan Bayrd through their DAF.



Game On! at the Library

Thanks to a grant from the **David & Kay Barnard** family's Donor Advised Fund, the **Menomonie Public Library** has launched a brand-new board game library! From classics to modern favorites, community members can now check out a wide variety of games. It's a fun way to spark connection, creativity, and play for all ages.

For more than 50 years, the Boyceville community has dreamed of a **new library**, and that dream is finally becoming reality. In response to decades of conversation and strong community support, the Boyceville Public Library Board and Building Committee are moving forward with plans for a new, state-of-theart facility.


Working with River Architects of La Crosse, the team has designed Wisconsin's first "Net Zero" library, meeting all of its energy needs with onsite renewable sources. In May 2024, the Village Board approved the old feed mill lot as the new library's future home, a site that will soon become a hub for learning, growth, and sustainability.

The new Boyceville Library Campaign was recently blessed with a \$25,000 legacy gift from the late Rebecca Rogers.

Becky dedicated her career to teaching in the Boyceville Area School District, where she inspired countless elementary students before her retirement. A lifelong learner who loved books, puzzles, and community, Becky's gift reflects her passion for education and her deep connection to Boyceville. Through her generosity, the library project will continue her legacy of learning, friendship, and faith, ensuring that future generations have a place to gather, grow, and discover.









OUR GRANTS MAKE MORE POSSIBLE

Play, Learn, Grow

The **Dunn County Playgroup** received a grant to continue and expand their services. Their families report powerful changes: parents who first met at Playgroup now support one another outside of sessions, children are reaching milestones like speaking their first words, and even at home, lessons carry over.

One mother summed up the difference best: "My child can't attend Playgroup because he is out of control, not nice to other kids, and will throw tantrums if he doesn't get his way." With coaching and support, she gave it a try, only to be amazed at her child's transformation.

Today, both mother and child are regular attendees, finding new ways to **thrive together**.



Constructing Career Pathways

Junior Achievement's Dunn County Construction Camp took place this summer, giving high school students a 5-day, hands-on look at construction careers. With support from the CFDC, the camp successfully introduced students to the construction industry through hands-on technical training, job search skills, home ownership education, and valuable networking with industry professionals.

The program met its goals of increasing student understanding of construction careers, strengthening workforce development, and providing meaningful career exploration opportunities.



A New Home for Hope



Mission Restoring Hope received a \$2,000 grant to relocate their collection center to a new, larger space in Wheeler, WI. The move not only provided room for their thrift store and donation center under one roof, but also strengthened community access and support.

In their first months, they served more than **300 people**, offering affordable clothing and essential items while also providing relief supplies to partner organizations locally and beyond. This new home has given Mission Restoring Hope stability, visibility, and the ability to grow their impact.

Monitoring for a Healthier Future

The **Free Clinic** received a grant to provide blood pressure monitors, logbooks, and heart-healthy resources for patients with **hypertension**.

We had a patient visit the Free Clinic after struggling to afford medications and office visits without insurance. We provided blood pressure medication, follow-up laboratory testing, and offered a home blood pressure machine, logbook, and DASH diet book. She was overjoyed with these offerings and began monitoring her blood pressure at home.

At her initial visit, her blood pressure was 160/100. After two months of education, medication, and support, her blood pressure consistently ranges between 120-130/70-80. Her kidney function has also improved. She expressed gratitude for the care she received and is scheduled to return in six weeks for a recheck.

Reaching for the Stars

The **Dunn County Historical Society** received a grant to bring the story of Wisconsin's only **NASA Moon Tree** to life. With new educational signage and tools, the project has already reached more than 230 visitors through school tours and community programs, inspiring pride and sparking curiosity in both kids and adults. The Moon Tree now serves as a hands-on learning opportunity that blends history with STEAM education, encouraging the next generation to "reach" for the stars.



Freezing out Hunger

Thanks to a generous donors and the Healthy Futures Fund, WestCAP's Boyceville Food Pantry has just added a brand-new freezer. This has expanded their ability to accept and store frozen food donations like meat, produce, and more.

This upgrade means less good food will go to waste and more nutritious options will be available for families in our community.



Bridging the Gap

Thanks to support from CFDC, the **Bridge to Hope** is addressing urgent needs for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking as they work to rebuild their lives. Many survivors leave dangerous situations with little more than the clothes on their backs, and financial insecurity can quickly become a barrier to achieving safety and independence.

This grant makes it possible to cover **critical expenses** that open doors to stability. **Survivors have received gas cards, bus tokens, and car repairs so they can get to work, school, court, or counseling.** Others have found safe housing with help for rental deposits and first month's rent. The program has also pays for birth certificates and Social Security cards – small but essential documents for securing jobs and benefits – as well as childcare, diapers, and phone minutes so parents can provide for their families and stay connected during crisis moments.

By removing these everyday obstacles, they empower survivors to take the next steps toward safety, healing, and long-term self-sufficiency. It's more than financial help—it's the bridge that makes a fresh start possible.



THE WOMEN'S GIVING CIRCLE

The Women's Giving Circle of Dunn County was established to strengthen the spirit of women and children through collaborative philanthropy, giving, and granting. The WGC strives to empower women to become stronger and self-sufficient in order to improve the quality of their lives and the lives of the people for whom they are responsible. The idea isn't new. 


